
When we say we welcome children in hard places with the love of Christ it means that we strive to model the grace, mercy, and compassion of Jesus as we work to meet their physical, emotional, educational, and spiritual needs. One of our greatest responsibilities is introducing a child to Christ, which became one of the greatest privileges for a housedad on our staff. He was able to baptize one of the girls in our care, signifying her trust in Christ. Another staff member who attended shared the following:

"She has been here for 3 years. It was a super special day filled with tears of joy from the residents, houseparents and staff. It was just the sweetest time. One resident said she cried so much her fake eyelash fell off (ha-ha)! This is

messy work, sometimes we shed tears for other reasons, but these were the kind of tears that keep us going. These men (our housedads) are a father to the fatherless, standing in the gap raising other people's children. I am proud to know them as well as their superduper amazing wives!"

This is what "welcoming children in hard places with the love of Christ" is all about.



Sensory Room Puts the Fun in Function







What once was just an idea has now become a hands-on reality and will have kids at our Chattanooga campus literally climbing the walls.

After years of dreaming and planning, the Chattanooga campus has completed the construction of its on-site sensory room! Also referred to as intentional movement spaces, sensory rooms are a valuable tool for helping children expend energy in positive ways. The square footage has served as a chapel, storage, and a temporary classroom during the pandemic, and now will meet a more therapeutic need for the kids here.

"For years, I have wanted to use this space for more than storage and create an area that would be beneficial to all of our residents. I have learned more and more over the last several years how pretty much all kids/teens (especially those with a trauma history) have sensory needs. Also, movement, play, and exercise for kids (and adults!) is not just beneficial to their bodies but their brains as well," explains Chattanooga campus Vice President Patrick Addison.

Thanks to the skills of TBCH staffer Mark Robinson, and a generous grant from the Emmy Lou Tompkins Foundation, kids will enjoy the safe and therapeutic benefit of a ball pit, climbing wall, rings, swings, and ramps—all designed to help children develop their minds as well as their muscles. This new space really puts the fun in function!




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Pray. Serve. Give.


POI Annual Report (Excerpts)

FOSTER CARE

TBCH served 175 children in foster homes across the state during the 2020-2021 fiscal year. This is down from 180 children served in the 2019-2020 fiscal year. Due to COVID several foster homes were unable to take placements for a period of time due to remote school and foster parents working at home.

Permanency Goals for Children in Foster Care

Reunification with parents, guardians or other family members was the goal for 50% of children placed in TBCH's foster homes, while 27% plan to move to an adoptive home at some point in the future. TBCH and DCS are working on Dual Goals (adoption/reunification) for 21% of the foster children in TBCH foster homes. Independent Living either with TBCH or through DCS's extension of foster care is the goal for 2% of the children/youth in TBCH foster care.

IPP Goals for Children in Foster Care

77% (up from 66% last year) of children placed in TBCH's foster homes completed at least one of the goals on their Individualized Program Plan. Even more impressive is the increase in the percentage of children who met 6 or more goals from 8% to 23%. This reflects the work of case managers, foster parents, biological parents and children working to progress in the areas monitored by the IPP including: Health/Medical, Education/Vocation, Social Skills, Emotional/Behavioral.

QCRR for Foster Care

Quarterly Case Records Reviews evaluate the presence, clarity, quality, continuity, and completeness of required documents for children/youth in residential program. The accuracy of the foster files consistently continues to increase, and the statewide average has remained above 96% for the previous year.


TBCH undergoes a four-year re-accreditation cycle with the Council on Accreditation. COA is an international, independent, nonprofit accreditor of human services organizations. Our program services, administration and management, and service delivery consistently receive high marks during this process. These excerpts from our *PQI Annual Report* represent the hard work and high standards of our Residential Care and Foster Care staff. We share them so that you can have confidence in the good work that God equips and allows us to do with your generous support.

RESIDENTIAL CARE

TBCH served 85 children on its three campuses in the 2020-2021 fiscal year. This is down from 99 children served in the 2020-2021 fiscal year. The 14% decrease was due to staffing shortages and ongoing placement struggles caused by COVID.

Permanency Goals for Children in Residential Care

Reunification with parents, guardians or other family members is the goal for 51% of TBCH's residents, while 10% plan to move to an adoptive home at some point in the future. TBCH is expected to provide Independent Living services for 24% of its current residents in the future. 15% of TBCH residents have Dual Goals which means they are preparing for more than one possible permanency goal (i.e., Reunification or Independent Living).



IPP Goals for Children in Residential Care



80% (no change from last year) of TBCH youth in Residential Care completed at least one of the goals on their Individualized Program Plan (IPP). The persistent COVID pandemic continued to hamper scheduling counseling sessions and family visitations. Although the number of residents who completed at least one goal was unchanged, residents who completed 6 or more goals increased by 44%. This indicates residents are making more progress in the areas monitored by the IPP including: Health/Medical, Education/Vocation, Social Skills, Emotional/Behavioral.

QCRR for Residential Care

Quarterly Case Records Reviews evaluate the presence, clarity, quality, continuity, and completeness of required documents for children/youth in residential care. The accuracy of the residential files consistently averages 100%.

It's Nice to be Noticed!

Our Chattanooga campus was recently chosen to receive the Governor's Award of Excellence from the Governor's Office of Faith-Based and Community Initiatives (tnfbci.org). Rock Legacy Continues at The Ranch

In 1947, John and Mamie Rock donated their home and farm in Bartlett, just outside of Memphis, to be used as a place to welcome children in hard places. In 1950 it became our campus in that region of the state. Throughout the years the campus grew, and a monument was prominently placed there to honor their sacrificial generosity and love for the kids. With the recent sale of that property, that monument now has a new home, and so will many more children in West Tennessee!

As the Rock property served children in Bartlett, homes were also built for young men at what is now The Ranch at Millington, a testimony to how God has blessed this ministry and allowed for its growth. The Rock monument has been carefully relocated to The Ranch, overlooking a place where we expect that growth to continue with the building of new homes to serve girls and younger children. As part of our strategic plan for the future, those homes and that monument will stand together in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Rock's legacy of providing for children.
