The staff of TBCH has carried a heavier burden than usual over the last several months, preparing for a review of our four-year accreditation process. The Council on Accreditation (COA) reviews organizations like ours as a licensing requirement, so we can continue providing residential care and foster care services, and we passed with flying colors! COA specifically reported that TBCH has a clear vision for the future, cohesion at our management level, and core values that are alive and well. In addition, children who were interviewed during the process stated that they felt heard, safe, and cared for. While we celebrate that our work has been rewarded by a positive COA report, our higher calling is reflected in Colossians 3:23-24, "Whatever you do, do your work heartily, as for the Lord rather than for men, knowing that from the Lord you will receive the reward of the inheritance. It is the Lord Christ whom you serve."



One of our girls accepted Christ as her personal savior in the home with her houseparents, was baptized by her housedad, and is now moving toward adoption into a forever family after being in our care for more than five years. The Lord has been so faithful to her!



Nearly 60 volunteers, clad in navy t-shirts emblazoned with the TVA logo, and armed with skills, tools, elbow grease, and a philanthropic attitude showed up and tackled projects all over the campus. Projects included interior and exterior painting, woodwork and repairs in the homes and offices, staining decks and outdoor

structures, landscaping projects, pressure washing, and even some mechanic work to help our Independent Living residents.

Their combined efforts totaled more than 360 people-hours of labor, which would have taken our staff alone weeks or more to accomplish.

New Office Space For Foster Care In East TN

he Foster Care team in the East region recently relocated from our Chattanooga campus. Following some clean-up work and unpacking, the move has taken them to Cleveland, TN, giving the Case Managers on staff additional elbow room and a more strategic location from which to support the current foster families on their caseloads.

Their new space is in a building that also houses Hope4One, an adoption and foster care ministry. This is a mutually beneficial relationship, as Hope4One serves families through a foster care closet, wrap around ministry, adoption grants, community events, and other support services.

The team views Cleveland as an area of potential growth, being well-situated between their previous space and our Foster Care office in Knoxville. While the move gives them a more effective geographic coverage in East Tennessee, they will continue to recruit and serve foster families in the Chattanooga area as well.

Frank Ingraham

isitors to the TBCH State Office at our Brentwood campus may notice a plaque attached to the wall just outside the door of our large conference room, identifying it as the Ingraham Room. For more than a quarter century this room has been more than just a place for administrative meetings. Around the table have been major ministry decisions, weekly worship and study of God's Word, countless prayer, and joyful celebrations.

The namesake of our conference room, Frank C. Ingraham, passed away on March 20 of this year. Mr. Ingraham served as counselor and trustee for TBCH, and was instrumental in gaining our tax-exempt status as a non-profit organization. He retired from a long and fruitful legal practice in 2014 and was also a retired captain in the Air Force, among other accomplishments. In addition to his influence, care, and deep love for this ministry, he was also a long-time Sunday School teacher and one of the first elders of Church of the City.
