# "I felt so welcomed..." Piper shares her experience in TBCH Residential and Foster Care

The stories of the children at TBCH have at least two things in common. One is that they come from hard places. The other is that they are loved. Otherwise, they are as unique as the fingerprints they leave on the windows and on our hearts. This unique story belongs to a young lady named Piper.

Piper has a passion for playing in her school marching school band and making new friends. She also has the rare distinction of having lived on one of our Residential Care campuses as well as being placed with one of our foster families.

"Before I came to TBCH I was living at a group home. Life there was hard, and I never found any joy in being there. I had been living there for two years and barely had family members that would come and see me. I was there trying to make the most of things and distract myself from problems with my family."

Sometimes kids in substitute care change locations before they find a place where they can thrive. Piper started a new chapter in her story when she was placed at TBCH at the age of 13. "I felt a bit of anxiety and expected it to be like the last place. I felt abandoned because all I wanted was to stay at a stable home where I felt comfortable. I thought of it as just another place my parents put me because they didn't want me, (but at TBCH) I felt so welcomed the first time I stepped into the house where I was placed."

Hanging out and playing basketball with the other kids were among her favorite activities. "The best part was getting to eat and laugh together at the dinner table. My houseparents were so excited to see us when we got home from school and would always ask us how our day was. It felt like a family." And she came to appreciate other less entertaining parts of the program. "One of the worst but best



parts was the structure. I always had chores or simple things I didn't want to do but I was pushed to do them because it made me better as a teenager."

Piper also connected well with the campus staff and is quick to thank them for the impact they've had on her. "They were so fun to be around and the were all so welcoming. My favorite part of the week was meeting with my case worker, Ms. Lauren. I loved her so much and I felt like I could tell her anything. I lived at TBCH for a year and half on campus and loved my time there. I will never forget how loved I was at TBCH—there was so much life change."



After some time on campus, the opportunity opened up for Piper to transition into one of our foster homes. "When I first met my foster family, I fit in right away. I couldn't wait to move in with them. They are the best family ever. It's been different from living on campus for sure. I'm held responsible for my mistakes and actions tremendously more. It still feels like a family, but I've noticed I am part of the family, so I have many responsibilities."

Piper is in the process of being adopted now, and welcomes prayers for that and for her as she plans to start a career in the Army. And for kids who may one day call TBCH home, she has this word of encouragement and verse of Scripture which was a guiding point for her, "Know you will be in the safest place ever. You will find your spot in a family that will never stop loving you and pushing you to be the best you can be. Be strong and courageous! Do not be terrified nor dismayed, for the LORD your God is with you wherever you go (Joshua 1:9)."






### Celebrating Adoptions


