## I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus. Philippians 3:14

It has been said if you talk the talk, you should walk the walk. Brad Boucher, Pastor of Students and Young Adults at Second Baptist Church in Union City, has literally walked the walk to raise funds and awareness for TBCH by participating in an ultramarathon, known as the Vol-State Road Race. Brad also serves on our Board of Trustees.

This was no stroll through the park. The Vol-State Road Race, according to the official website, "begins with a ferry ride across the Mississippi River, from Missouri to Kentucky, and finishes at The Rock high atop Sand Mountain in Northwest Georgia. What lies in between are 314 miles of the great unknown."

You read that right—three hundred and fourteen miles, on foot.

Participants had ten days in the July heat to traverse a route of highways and backroads on foot, "over hills and across rivers, up mountains and down long valleys, all the while accounting for all their most basic needs; what will I eat? When will I find water? Where will I sleep?"

Brad acknowledges both the physical and mental strain of the endeavor. At one point he ran out of sunscreen and had to cover all but a spot to breathe through while he traveled. Aside from that, an occasional dog barking at him, and a car or two getting a little too close, he says he felt generally well-prepared and safe. In talking with him afterwards, he seemed most encouraged by the opportunity to share his faith in Christ with fellow runners, some of whom he stuck with closely throughout the final miles. "I'm still trying to figure out how something can be so painstakingly miserable but yet fun at the same time...the kindness we have experienced from people from the beginning to this point has been overwhelming."

Through word of mouth and social media, pledgers donated to TBCH amounts based on how many miles he completed. He blew way past his original goal, doubling it to raise almost \$20,000 for the kids in our care, and pledged gifts keep arriving. Brad expressed his gratitude in update videos on social media during the trek. "Thank you for all the support that just continues to come in not just for me, but for the Children's Homes, I can't say how much I appreciate that!" he shared in one.

The race began on July 10, and a third of those who began dropped out before the end. Brad completed the entire 314 miles. He gave God the glory by crossing the finish line with a very respectable time of 7 days, 13 hours, 18 minutes and 51 seconds.

Our thanks and admiration go out to our champion, Brad Boucher, for all he does for TBCH, and to the supporters he has rallied for our kids. (And we thought just serving on our Board of Trustees was a commitment!)


#### NEW HOMES, NEW NAMES



# Project Impact Report: A DEEPER DIVE into data and impact measurement



We want everything we do for our kids, from making breakfast to building new campus homes, to have a meaningful, measurable, and lasting effect on them.

Recently, we completed a research project to measure the **IMPACT** our services have on the children in our care. Through interviews and surveys, we compiled data in nine different impact areas. Here's a little bit of what we found, and what the children said:



**EDUCATION:** Residents at TBCH experience growth in academic progress and learn the importance of continuing education. "I used to do good in school just to play sports...but now I'm getting to reap the reward of working hard academically."

**SPIRITUAL GROWTH:** Many children experience spiritual growth after living on a TBCH campus. "They're teaching me not to hold anything back from the Lord... to give it all to Him."

**EMPATHY:** The residents at TBCH are developing significant emotional maturity through empathy. "When you care for others, it teaches you to care for yourself, too."

#### "Every Foster Home Needs a Mrs. Betty"

Mrs. Betty McMahan is a true champion and friend of the children being served by our Foster Care Program in Oakdale. Married to Ronnie McMahan and a member of Robertsville Baptist Church in Oak Ridge, Mrs. Betty began supporting TBCH in 1987, when she was asked to lead a Mission Education class for teenagers. One of the kids in her class brought a request, "Instead of reading about missions, we want to go and do something." This led to a connection with our former Oakdale campus, where there happened to be a pressing need for socks and underwear for the kids. Meeting this need was just the beginning of a long and fruitful friendship between Mrs. Betty and TBCH.

In the years to come, she would spearhead many more efforts. A Thanksgiving dinner was planned, including donated food and volunteers to work alongside the resident kids to prepare it. Later, Mrs. Betty rallied her church for an Angel Tree project. A few years ago, when the Oakdale campus transitioned to a foster home, Scott and Melody Kellison moved in to serve as foster parents. Mrs. Betty enlisted help, including the Briceville (TN) Ministry Center, to provide clothing for the foster kids who would be living there.

The impact of her efforts has been enhanced by her connection to the kids, taking time to talk with and listen to each child, making sure the children get exactly what they want and need. When new children are placed with the Kellisons, they each receive a new pillow, covered with a handmade pillowcase—a keepsake they take with them when they leave Oakdale, compliments of Mrs. Betty and a team of local seamstresses. Even further, every child receives a birthday card from her, and she's been known to bake a cake on occasion as well!

When asked about her favorite memory, Mrs. Betty recalled a young girl she met at Oakdale several years ago who was striking out on her own after her high school graduation and needed a suitcase. After the ceremony, Mrs. Betty met her backstage with a new suitcase as a gift. "Nobody from my family came to my graduation," the girl said as tears pooled in her eyes, "but you did." Through tears of her own, Mrs. Betty said, "I will never forget that moment."

Although she's leading the charge, she humbly gives credit to others—her church family, Pastor Jack Abott (Associate Pastor of Missions and student minister at Robertsville), the Kellisons, and TBCH staff. But giving credit where it's due, Pastor Abott says, "Betty's ministry is marked by her quiet strength, unwavering compassion, and a servant's heart that reflects the love of Christ in everything she does." And Mrs. Kellison echoes that sentiment, "Every foster home needs a Mrs. Betty; she is the grandmother who is here to spoil these children. Mrs. Betty is the steady and consistent friend amidst the chaos of these children's lives."
